You are a healthy <u>37-year-old</u> woman, mother of a complete family with <u>2 children</u>. One of the children was born <u>by caesarean section</u>. Your child wish has been completed.

For the past two years you have suffered from <u>a lot of blood loss</u> during your period. Every month again, (sometimes) for even 12 days! This puts you in an uncomfortable or clumsy situation several times. You also suffer from heavy pains during your period.

You have been satisfactorily examined by the gynaecologist and <u>nothing abnormal</u> has been found. Your gynaecologist discusses the treatment options for heavy blood loss. The pill and Mirena IUD appear not to be a suitable option for you.

Possible treatments are:

- 1. Endometrial ablation. A treatment to eliminate or reduce this heavy loss of blood. The endometrium is removed under local anaesthesia or during a light sedation at the outpatient clinic. After a short treatment of only 30 minutes, you can go home after 1 hour. Theoretically, this has a success rate of 85% (complete disappearance or reduction of vaginal blood loss). Although you remain fertile, pregnancy is not recommended because of the high risks for you and the unborn child, so you should take contraception.
 - 2. Surgical removal of the entire uterus under general anaesthetics. This gives you an almost certain guarantee that the menstrual bleeding will disappear. After this operation, you will be hospitalized for 2 to 5 days. Unfortunately, this operation is not without risks (possible risks include thrombosis, bleeding, cystitis). Long-term consequences can include complaints of prolapse and change in sexual experience.




